April 2012

We started our April with a fantastic presentation by Patricia Rael from the Don't Use Drugs Ever (DUDE) organization. She conducted an interactive meeting with the participants about Methamphetamines. The students were engaged and contributed to the discussion. She even handed out prizes! The other meeting we taught this month was on drug and alcohol awareness. April is alcohol awareness month, so we did a couple activities around that theme. During this lesson the students are given an opportunity to have honest discussions about how drugs and alcohol affect our lives. They all made "comics" about a personal experience that involved drug or alcohol. Many of the students wrote about family members or friends that were dealing with addiction to alcohol, marijuana, or Meth.

ScOutreach also hosted some great community service opportunities this month. We participated in a cleanup with Toss No Mas in Belen. The scouts walked around and picked up trash. We ended at Timan Park in Belen and the scouts suggested returning for another service to build up the playground and other facilities. Our next service was at the Los Lunas Baptist Church. The church Pastor greeted us, and gave some background of the church and future projects. The pastor led the group in a round of introductions. He then broke the students up and divided the groups along the fence line. We were weeding the grounds and picking up trash. The pastor interacted with all the students and served as a great mentor. Our final service activity of the month was at Skarsgard Farms. This is the site of the former Los Poblanos Organics that we've partnered with in the past. The only difference is they swapped the chickens for pigs. We happened ScOutreach received a tour of the farm and some basic information on how the farm functions. We were tasked with weeding the beet field. Before we started weeding the students were able to sample a raw beet, pulled straight out of the ground. This was great, because none of the students had ever tried a beet before! We also learned a bit about the native weeds, and how this one variety has 30ft by 30ft root systems that go all the way down to the water table. We spent the rest of the time pulling weeds from the beet beds. Before we left the students were allowed to meet the ponies and piglets.
